COVID-19 SAFETY GUIDELINES

- We will not require proof of vaccine unless required by CSU or local health authorities. We will operate on the honor system and recommend that those not fully vaccinated wear a mask while indoors.

CURRICULUM

The goal of Water Literate Leaders of Northern Colorado is to convene current and emerging leaders from the region's communities to convey an understanding of basic water information and issues critical to future decisions that will have deep influence over their communities' long-term economic, social, and environmental sustainability. The program will:

- Create a cohort of community leaders with knowledge and concern about our region's water future
- Introduce participants to key regional and statewide players in water
- Impart information about water institutions, policies, and issues from multiple angles
- Provide an opportunity for discussion that delves deep into the area's water challenges and possibilities
- Showcase and examine examples of water leadership as a means of encouraging leadership in participants
- Develop and maintain a community of Water Literate Leader graduates who can cooperate on regional water projects

Our curriculum is somewhat fluid so that we can take advantage of opportunities and your input as we go. It reflects the areas of emphasis we will be concentrating on and the expert resources we will engage. We aim for sessions to relay information critical to each topic area and provide opportunities for you to engage with our experts and with each other. We will supplement speaker presentations by providing you with links to pertinent resource materials from time to time. All materials will be posted on our website at watercenter.colostate.edu/wll

Session Content at a Glance

Each session includes:

- A debrief of the previous session, including homework responses and questions remaining
- Topic-focused book discussions led by class participants
- Presentations from key experts
- Leadership Challenge: key water leaders will tell stories about their water leadership experiences and engage in dialogue about what we can learn to inform and inspire the leadership needed to address our region's water issues
- Time for individual discussion and building relationships with your classmates

Post-Session Homework

Program participants are required to submit their responses to the following three questions before 5:00 PM on the Monday after each session. Your responses will be compiled and shared with the class (without attribution) and provide a valuable opportunity for discussion and clarification at the next session.

- 2. What did you learn today that encouraged you, discouraged you, or captured your attention to the extent that you could see yourself engaging in it further?
- 3. What questions do you have based on what you heard from today's speakers and group discussion?

Book Assignment

During our first session, you will choose a future date to provide a brief book report to the class. Your report should include a 2-3 minute overview and key takeaways from your perspective as a community leader. You will then lead the class in a short discussion about an important point or two from the book. We also request you include a short section on the ways the book you chose relates to the day's topic, e.g. If you are giving your report before the Water for Agriculture session, please discuss how agricultural perspectives were treated in your book.

We set aside 30 minutes at the beginning of each session for book reports (3 reports per class x 10 minutes per book). We will provide you with a list of recommended reading to get you started, and we have a small collection of books that were donated by previous class members that you are welcome to borrow.

Attend a Water-Related Meeting or Event

One way to learn about water is to attend events and engage with other attendees. Over the course of the class, select at least one water-focused meeting, conference, or workshop that will allow you to learn about a particular subject matter and network with others. You will provide a brief written overview describing key takeaways from your perspective as a community leader. Your submission will be shared with the class, and we will set aside time for group discussion as time permits.

Examples of local events to consider: <u>South Platte Basin Roundtable</u> meetings, <u>South Platte Forum</u>, <u>Big Thompson Watershed Forum Conference</u>, <u>Poudre River Forum</u>, <u>Colorado Ag Water Alliance Summit</u>, and the <u>Colorado Water Congress Convention</u>. About The Great Divide

"Tens of millions of people, billions of dollars of agricultural production, and an enormous amount of economic activity across a vast swath of America from California to the Mississippi River are all dependent on rivers born in the mountains of Colorado. In a time of mounting demand and limited supply, the need for all citizens to better understand and participate in decisions affecting this critical resource is paramount. The Great Divide, a feature-length documentary film from the Emmy award-winning team of Havey Productions, in association with Colorado Humanities, illustrates the timeless influence of water in connecting and dividing an arid state and region. From Ancient Puebloan cultures and the gold rush origins of Colorado water law to agriculture, dams, diversions, and conservation, the film reveals today's critical need to cross "the great divide," replacing conflict with cooperation. The Great Divide raises public understanding and appreciation of Colorado's water heritage while inspiring personal responsibility and informed discussion concerning the vital challenge confronting the state and region with increasing urgency — forging collaborative solutions for managing this most precious resource for a prosperous and sustainable future."
